Loving the Lost Luke 15:1-10; James 2:14-16

Introduction:

A. Comfortable Christians

- 1. It's easy to get comfortable as a Christian living in the Bible Belt of the USA.
 - a) There are lots of opportunities to spend lots of time with other Christians.
 - b) Christian groups fight for our religious freedoms.
 - c) We listen to Christian radio while driving to our favorite Christian bookstore.
 - d) Many of these things are gifts from God, but did Jesus intend us to insulate ourselves to the point where all we feel is annoyed when non-Christian people do un-Christianly things in our presence?
- 2. We have the mind of Christ and we need to have Jesus's heart for the lost.
 - a) You can see the great love that God has for the lost through a look at the parables of the lost sheep and the lost coin in Luke 15:1-10.
 - b) Do I have this kind of love for the lost?
 - (1) Do I notice the lost?
 - (2) Do I seek the lost?
 - (3) Do I rejoice when the lost are found?

I. A Friend of Sinners

A. Who's on Your Friends List?

- 1. It's amazing that a lot of Christians don't seem to like non-Christians aka the *lost* or the *unchurched*.
- 2. Often we want to keep away from messy people and that's amazing because our lives are messy too!
- 3. After coming to Christ and growing in knowledge, too many of us distance ourselves from our lost friends.
 - a) We seem to have less time for the hurting and struggling.
 - b) We've found the thing that meets the need in our lives, but what about those who need the very thing we've found.
- 4. This separation is usually not intentional, but it happens.

B. Jesus lived differently.

- 1. One of the common criticisms Jesus faced was that he spent too much time with sinners.
- 2. How many of us could be accused of spending too much time with sinners?
- 3. Jesus was not just waiting for Paul to write, "Bad company corrupts good morals" in 1 Corinthians.
- 4. No one better understood the importance of spiritual maturity, scriptural knowledge, a strong prayer life and positive influences than Jesus.
- 5. But He also knew these things were not for His personal benefit, but they are meant to strengthen us so we can share with the lost.
- 6. The Christian life is not about safety and comfort!
- 7. It is about finding yourself in a dangerous place of vulnerable compassion.

C. Jesus was called "a friend of sinners".

- 1. That was the word on the street in first-century Palestine.
- 2. That phrase "friend of sinners" is mentioned twice in the Gospels Matthew 11:19 and Luke 7:34.
 - a) The religious aristocracy, criticized Jesus as a "glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners."
 - b) They called him this because it was true!
 - c) Jesus still is a friend of sinners!
 - d) Jesus said that he didn't come for the spiritually healthy, but for the sick. "I have not come to call the righteous but sinners to repentance" (Luke 5:31–32).
- 3. Just like he greeted children that others thought were a nuisance, he welcomed sinners that others didn't (Matthew 19:14; Luke 7:37–39).
 - a) Jesus looked at the rich young ruler and He loved him (Mark 10:21).
 - b) Jesus had compassion for lost people.

- c) And most glorious of all, He used His authority to speak those wondrous words, "Your sins are forgiven" (Luke 7:48).
- 4. This is all very important for us because we are supposed to pattern our lives after Jesus's example.
- 5. If Jesus was a friend of sinners, we should be too somehow, someway.

D. Our Goal

- 1. Our goal in this world is to love others, not to be liked (1 Timothy 1:5).
 - a) Jesus constantly infuriated the culture of His day.
 - b) They knew his teaching contradicted their own, and rather than like him and wrap their arms around him in happy tolerance, they tried to shut him up (Mark 12:12).
- 2. Jesus wasn't a favorite of the leaders or the people!
 - a) They crucified Him! The leaders and the people.
 - b) Even after saying "Teacher, we know that you are true and do not care about anyone's opinion. For you are not swayed by appearances . . ." (Mark 12:14).
 - c) This means Jesus didn't let the crowd dictate his message.

II. Showing God's Love

A. Windows of Opportunity

- 1. During my quiet time I came across this quote,
- 2. "We are given small windows of opportunity to show God's love in tangible ways."
- 3. Jesus' mission on earth was to redeem the lost, the brokenhearted, to proclaim freedom for the captives, and release from darkness for the prisoners. (Luke 4:18)
 - a) If you are a Christian, then you were once lost too.
 - b) So how come as Christians we find it so hard to relate to lost people?
 - c) Maybe because *relate* means that we have to develop *relationships*?!
- 4. One of the most practical ways we might put the gospel to work as friends of sinners is to develop relationships with them!
 - a) With the widows, the blind, the broken, the hurting—whoever has a need.
 - b) If we're not in relationships with lost people, we sure won't be able to relate to them easily.
 - c) Don't forget! We do have a common thread: we are all image-bearers of the one true God.
- 5. Jesus had the amazing ability of living in this world, yet He was not of it.
 - a) He didn't care who He was hanging out with; sinners, prostitutes, tax collectors, lepers, etc.
 - b) So why should I?
 - c) He developed relationships with them.
 - d) He invested Himself into their lives while on earth, even unto His death!
- 6. While hanging out with these sinners, He talked about God, sin, eternity, love, hope.
 - a) Jesus knew what they needed in their lives and He talked about those things and they listened to Him because they knew He cared for them.
 - b) Jesus did not play games.
 - c) He cut to the core and dismantled their beliefs and bad choices by asking simple questions.
 - d) Yet He did so with love and humility.

B. Being Intentional

- 1. Why was Jesus able to accomplish both?
- 2. Because everything Jesus did was intentional.
 - a) *Intentional* = "being characterized by conscious design or purpose; done or made or performed with purpose and intent."
 - b) Never on earth has there been a man of such purpose.
- 3. Jesus came to save.
 - a) In Luke 19:10 our Lord says He came to seek and save the lost.
 - b) Then He says to us in John 20:21, "As the Father has sent me, I also send you."
- 4. Most of us are stuck in a Christian bubble.
 - a) It's a nice place where you know your friends share the same beliefs.
 - b) You can let your hair down. You can play your Christian music.
 - c) The only time I am in the vicinity of lost people is out in the world, in the community, doing errands a pretty limited scope of interaction.
